LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear HOPE Friends.

The most significant happening within HOPE this year was the retirement of our founder and president, Barbara Couch, from her formal role leading our philanthropic mission and Foundation. Barbara and her husband Dick Couch established Hypertherm's Associate Stock Ownership Plan in 2003. Barbara felt that the Company, now owned by its Associates, should also have all the philanthropic and community decisions be made by Associates. The first "Philanthropy Team" was formed and evolved into the HOPE Foundation.

Barbara's audacious, visionary leadership has guided HOPE ever since. We already miss her compassion, generosity, faith in those around her, and impatience for positive impact and change. However, great leaders inspire and empower their team to accomplish great things, even when they have moved on, and Barbara established the standard. I am humbled to be the new President of HOPE, to be the one to share with you the latest work of the compassionate Associates within the Foundation and the committed partners across our communities during this challenging year.

The HOPE Team deployed generous donations made to the COVID relief fund totaling \$151,761 to our nonprofit partners. These partners have relentlessly continued to address

the increasingly acute needs across our communities. Our Associates were able to reconnect in our communities serving with necessary safety protocols in place. While in the fiscal year 2020, which for the HOPE Foundation ends in June, we served 27,757 hours, despite several months of no volunteering capability, in 2021 we served a remarkable 22,416 hours.

During 2020, the HOPE Foundation joined the chorus of voices committing to address racial inequities and injustices and released a statement pledging our commitments. Words are easy and potentially hollow; acting and creating a positive impact is challenging yet most meaningful. In the last year, the HOPE Foundation has worked to do just that. In 2020, we:

- Requested and participated in a workshop on understanding and managing Implicit Bias
- Sponsored and attended a statewide 21-day workplace racial equity learning challenge through New Hampshire Businesses for Social Responsibility
- Partnered with PEAK Grantmaking, a nonprofit partner committed to transforming philanthropy by advancing equitable, effective grantmaking practices. Their CEO and leader educated us on Inclusive Grantmaking principles at our annual team retreat.
 Our team created and prioritized action items which we have since been implementing. We deepened our learning and refined our action

- items through a second workshop on Reducing Bias in Grantmaking
- Conducted an audit of our grant application process for perpetuating bias and inequity and simplified, shifted, and changed our approach.

I look forward to sharing the impacts of the changes we make in next year's report. Our work to address racial inequities and injustices also feeds the strategic planning our Foundation is doing when it comes to general community grants, global philanthropy work, and each of our strategic focus areas – STEM, Substance Use Disorders, and Early Childhood.

This last year has been a tremendous test of our collective principles and commitments. I am proud to have seen us stay true, and in fact deepen our commitments, to our guiding principles listed here on this same page. Indeed, another proof of the insights Barbara had eighteen years ago: empowered, collaborative, inclusive, and diverse Associates truly are the catalysts for sustainable positive change.

2021 APPRECIATION EVENTS

Donor appreciation

In late May, the HOPE Foundation celebrated its donors at its annual appreciation event, held virtually this year because of the ongoing pandemic. HOPE Foundation President, Jenny Levy, continued the tradition, started by founder Barbara Couch, of honoring donors who helped the HOPE Foundation retain its public charity status. Jenny remarked on "the compassion and generosity of Associates who put community first, doing what is needed to help." In response to last year's crisis, donations of \$151,761 were collected and distributed quickly to alleviate unexpected expenses for local nonprofits. Associates found creative ways to continue volunteering despite social distancing restrictions and stayat-home orders. When the community experienced a shortage of personal protective equipment, our Associates rallied, making thousands of items, and quickly distributing them in our communities. In addition, our virtual event included the annual presentation of the Gary Gaudette Exemplary Service Award and a panel discussion with

leaders representing four nonprofits, who regularly receive funding and volunteer support from HOPE. The event helped attendees understand the organizational capabilities of these nonprofits and raise awareness of the needs within the communities. After sharing how their organizations pivoted to the evolving needs, these nonprofit leaders explained how each of their organizations is embedding inclusion, diversity, and equity into their work.

On January 25, 2021, the HOPE Foundation Board of Trustees formally marked and celebrated the close of Barbara Couch's incredible tenure as president of the HOPE Foundation. During an online gratitude event, we honored Barbara's work and years of service with an appreciation video of remembrances and wishes. At the same time, we announced the creation of the Barbara J. Couch Opportunity Fund, a fund within the HOPE Foundation intended to support breakthrough strategic funding opportunities. We also gathered a collection of personal notes and letters for Barbara, let her



know about several generous donations made to HOPE in Barbara's honor, and presented commendations from the Governor of New Hampshire Chris Sununu and the NH State Legislatures.

2021 GARY GAUDETTE EXEMPLARY SERVICE AWARD

The HOPE Foundation proudly presented the 2021 Gary Gaudette Exemplary Service Award to Barbara and Dick Couch during our Donor Appreciation event on May 25. Jenny Levy highlighted the lifelong work of Barbara and Dick Couch to model what it means to serve in the community.







VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHTS

STRATEGIC SPOTLIGHT - EARLY CHILDHOOD

The HOPE Foundation added early childhood support as a focus area in 2020. We began by identifying current gaps and developing strategies to address those gaps. This worked helped us reach two conclusions: (1) parents and caregivers struggle to access safe, affordable, and convenient childcare; and (2) the first four years of a child's life are critical to determining future outcomes. This led to the creation of the following three pillars.



Parental confidence

The HOPE Foundation plans to support programs that help new parents build the skills and confidence needed to be the best parents they can be. This includes helping parents build a peer support network.

Youth resilience

The foundation wants to fund programs that provide kids with the skills needed to overcome and adapt to life's challenges.

Childcare center quality

HOPE aspires to improve the quality of our childcare centers so all parents can access high quality care for their children. We will accomplish this in part by funding programs that provide training and certification to childcare educators.



Early actions include:

- Hosting a virtual roundtable with several nonprofit organizations including Early Care Education Association Upper Valley, The Family Place, Good Beginnings, TLC Family Resource Center, and Waypoint.
- Developing a scoring rubric to evaluate early childhood grant requests.
- Continuing to research ways to best support young children.
- Curating and distributing new parent resources to Associates.
- Distributing youth bike helmets and safety gear to Associates with young children.
